FY 06—07 Budget Approved

The FY 06-07 Budget was approved by the Riverdale Park Town Council on Monday, June 19, 2006. Expenditures were increased by 0.56% or \$20,632.11 from the Mayor Vernon Archer's original proposed budget. The following items accounted for the increase: General Government increased by \$3,090.68 for salaries, benefits, newsletter, and legal counsel; the Police Department increased by \$5,270.29 for salaries and benefits; and, the Public Works Department increased by \$12,271.14 for parks maintenance, tree removal, building maintenance, and electricity for Street lights.

Tax rates changed slightly because the interest rates increased from the time the proposal was made until the time the council could act. The rate changed from 63.73 to 64.1 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation by the State of Maryland. **Editor's note:** To illustrate an example of what your taxes will be; if your home is assessed at \$100,000, you will be assessed \$641.00 in taxes for Fiscal Year 07.

Economic Development Update

Here is a quick update on some items happening in Riverdale Park:

The Patriot Group will make a presentation to Riverdale Park's Town Council Legislative meeting on July 3, 2006 at 8:00 p.m. The Patriot Group will be asking for general comments from the Town Council about their proposed project plans for 144 unit condominiums at Dumm's Corner. Plans for the 144 unit condominium project are available for review at the municipal building. The proposed project location is on Lafayette Street and would span the areas currently housing the credit union, Dumm's corner market and sub shop, and the adjacent boarding house and parking lot.

A Public Hearing will be held on July 10, 2006 at 7:30 p.m. at Town Hall regarding the Potomac Development Corporation/Wachovia Bank proposal concerning parking at Beale Circle Parking . The Town Council is looking at how to assist businesses along Route 1 by enhancing parking behind their buildings.

The University of Maryland will be officially selling the vacant Aircoup building (also known as the old NOAA building) to KSI for redevelopment at the end of July. KSI is proposing 490 condominium units at this location and is planning on making the road between River Tech Court and Lafayette "official." Fifty of the proposed condominium units would be retained by the University of Maryland to recruit the best and brightest Ph.D. and graduate students from around the world. More details on this project will be known once the sale is complete and KSI presents its site plans. Are you an artist living in Riverdale Park? Town Hires Deputy Administrator

Town Administrator, Patrick Prangley, announced that Dannielle M. Glaros has been hired as Riverdale Park's Deputy Town Administrator. Dannielle began working June 19, 2006 at the Town Offices. She is a graduate of Bucknell University with a double degree in Economics and Geography. She received her Masters in Public Policy from the University of Maryland's School of Public Affairs at College Park.. Dannielle previously worked for Smart Growth America, a national non-profit organization that works with communities across the country to manage their growth and encourage revitalization. She also worked with the State of Maryland Governor's Office of Smart Growth as Deputy Chief of Staff.

As Riverdale Park's Deputy Town Administrator, Dannielle is working on economic development, communications, and coordinating several administrative functions. Dannielle, her husband Steve, and daughter Lilly live in Riverdale Park.

Proposed Ordinance Resolutions

The Town Council is considering the following five proposed ordinance resolutions.

Resolution 2006-OR-03

Whereas, the Annotated Code of Maryland Section 21-1010 which defines the parking of commercial vehicles in residential areas of Prince George's county outside of the boundaries of municipal corporations uses a different definition of a non-commercial vehicle,

Therefore, be it resolved to amend Section 64-12 of the Code of Riverdale Park as follows: (Text to be deleted is struck-through, new text is in italics)

§ 64-12. Limitations on parking or standing of certain vehicles on streets or highways.

It shall be unlawful to park or leave standing on the streets, highways, and public spaces of the town any truck, truck-tractor, trailer or semi tractortrailer, including but not limited to travel trailers, camping trailers, tractor trailers, or any combination of motor vehicles with one (1) or more vehicles propelled or pushed as a unit, mobile homes, special mobile equipment including but not limited to tractors, construction or maintenance machinery, ditchdigging apparatus and concrete mixers, buses and school buses, and boat trailers except that exception may be made for trucks parked or left standing temporarily in the transaction of some business enterprise by permission of the Mayor and Council for good cause shown. This law shall not apply to those lightweight pickup or panel body trucks commonly described as having one-half-ton to one-ton capacities and which are not used in the furtherance of commercial enterprise. This section shall not apply to any vehicle that is of a type capable of being registered under Maryland law as a Class A (passenger) vehicle or as a Class E (truck) and the manufacturer's rated capacity is 3/4 ton or less and the maximum gross vehicle weight is 7,000 pounds or less.

Resolution 2006-OR-04

Whereas, fences are regularly constructed in the Town without first obtaining a building permit from the Town,

Therefore, the fee for an "ex post facto" (i.e., after the fact) fence building permit should be increased to \$100 from the regular fee by amending Section 15-9, Permit Fees, of the Code of Riverdale Park by adding the following sentence at the end of the section. When a fence has been constructed before the issuance of the appropriate Town building permit, the fee shall be \$100.

Resolution 2006-OR-05

Whereas, Chapter 15 of the Code of Riverdale Park restricts certain activities to the Building Inspector,

Therefore, the following changes are proposed to expand the Town's ability to enforce the Code (new text is in Italics; deleted text is struck-through)

§ 15-9. Permit fees.

The fees for building permits to be issued by the Town Building Inspector Administrator shall be three-quarters (3/4) of those prescribed for a similar permit under the Building Code of Prince George's County, as amended. The fee for any permit shall not be less than twenty five (\$25) dollars.

§ 15-12. Violations; procedures.

The Town Building Inspector, *or Code Enforcement Officer*, shall serve a notice of violation or order on the person responsible for the erection, construction, alternation, extension, repair, use, or occupancy of a building or structure in violation of the provisions of this chapter, or in violation of a detailed statement or plan approved thereunder, or in violation of a permit issued under this chapter, and such order shall direct the discontinuance of the illegal action or condition and the abatement of the violation. The Town Building Inspector, *or Code Enforcement Officer*, shall for ward a copy of such notice to the Mayor and Council.

§ 15-14. Prosecutions

Whenever directed by the Mayor and Council, the Town Building Inspector, or Code Enforcement Officer, shall cause the institution of appropriate proceedings at law or in equity to restrain, correct, or abate any violation of this chapter, or to require the removal or termination of the unlawful use of the building or structure in violation of the provisions of this chapter or of the order or direction made pursuant thereto.

Resolution 2006-OR-06

Whereas, several employees positions in the Classified service are recommended to be Exempt or

Professional under the definitions of the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA),

Therefore, the following changes are proposed to the Code of Riverdale Park (new text is in italics)

§ 2-4. Establishment of civil service departments and classified service positions.

Pursuant to the authority vested in the town under Articles III and VII of the Charter, the following departments in the civil service of the town are established.

- (a) Town Office;
- (b) Public Works Department; and
- (c) Police Department.

Subject to the provisions of § 705 of the Charter and § 2-6 of this chapter, the employees of these departments and any other departments or employee positions which may be hereafter created are members of the classified civil service of the town and subject to the merit systems that are a part of the classified civil service of the town.

The following positions are considered to be professional/exempt under the definitions of federal law: in the Town Office, the Code Enforcement Supervisor/ Manager and the Deputy/ Assistant Town Administrator; in the Police Department, the ranks of Captain and above; in Public Works, the Deputy/Assistant Public Works Director.

Resolution 2006-OR-07

Whereas, several questions have been raised about the clarity of the Chapter 66, Walls, Fences, and Hedges,

Therefore the following changes are proposed (added language is in italics, deleted language is struck-through)

§ 66-1. Height of walls and fences.

(a) It shall be unlawful for any person to erect any wall or fence, or combination thereof, in excess of three and one-half $(3 \cdot)$ feet in height, measured from the surface of the finished grade, around or on any property within the town without first obtaining a permit from the Mayor and Council.

(b) A permit may be granted for any deviation from such height as a special exception by the Mayor and Council if the fence is located to the rear of the *front* building line *or the front wall of the structure whichever is farther from the front lot line*, or if it is an ornamental iron fence or such that would enhance the beauty of the property. *The rear yard is defined as the area between the rear lot line and the rear building line or the rear wall of the structure whichever is farther from the rear lot line.* The Mayor and Council may require as a condition of granting a special exception that any such proposed fence having a more finished face on one side be so erected that the more finished face is outward when viewed from the surrounding properties.

§ 66-1.1 Prohibited Fences.

(c) Front Yard Fences. Except as otherwise provided, all metal fences are prohibited between the front building line of *the* property *or the front wall of the structure whichever is farther from the front lot line* and other adjacent property, dwelling, publicly dedicated street, private street or parking area.

(e) Permitted From Front Yard Fences. Fences that otherwise meet all design and construction specifications of the building codes of the Town of Riverdale Park and Prince George's County, Maryland, as well as the Ordinance Code of the Town of Riverdale Park shall be permitted as front yard fences so long as they are not constructed of chain-link.

(f) Corner Lots- Special Rule of Construction. For any property deemed to be corner lot under this section, in addition to other proscriptions of the section, no chain-link fence may be erected along the side yard that abuts a public right of way. No side fence abutting the public right of way may extend forward of the front building line or the front wall of the structure, whichever is farther from the front lot line.

All About Fences

Council Considers New Fence Rules

Ward 5 Councilmember Gerard Kiernan has submitted several excellent clarifications to our town code on fences. The council also is discussing the following changes to reduce red tape, make the code more consistent with county rules, and bring our code closer to actual practice:

1. Proposed: front yard fences (still no chain link) may be as high as 4 feet. A look around town shows most existing picket fences are 48 inches high.

2. Proposed: a town permit will not be needed for any fully conforming fence up to 48 inches tall. This matches the county regulations and will reduce time spent processing permits.

3. Proposed: six-foot privacy fences may be placed in the rear yard without special council permission (a building permit would still be required).

4. Proposed: if a fence is erected before a required permit is obtained, the fee will increase from \$25 to \$100.

NOTE: the above proposals are only under discussion and are *not* current code. Except for #4, they have not been officially introduced. You can contribute your thoughts by e-mail to Town Talk *www.tinyurl.com/dn6tj*, by contacting your council representative, or by attending a council meeting.

Thinking About a New Fence?

Remember to review the town's limitations on fence height and materials and to get all the needed permits.

If you are replacing an existing fence **exactly**, then no permit is needed, but under current town code **any** change to the fence requires a town permit. You will need a permit to change the material, height, or placement of the fence. Two permits may be required, one from the county and one from Riverdale Park. If the fence is 48 inches or shorter, no county permit is needed, but under current town code, you will need a town permit. In addition, any variation from the code will require council approval.

The Riverdale Park Code is 184 pages long; the section on fences is just 2 pages. It can be read online at *http://www.ci.riverdale-park.md.us/ AboutRiverdalePark/LawsOfTown/Code.pdf* Chapter 66 deals with fences; search for 6601. Here is a summary:

- The maximum height is 42 inches (this could change to 48 inches). The council can approve taller fences.
- Chain link is prohibited in front yards, as are most metal fences such as chicken wire and barbed wire. Certain metal fences, such as ornamental iron, are permitted.

• The fence may not obstruct visibility at intersections.

Simple Steps To Follow

1. Start with a basic drawing of what you want. You can draw it yourself, as long as it shows the size of your lot and the location of the proposed fence. An accurate survey plat is **not** required.

2. If you aren't doing it yourself, discuss the project with a fence company. Ask if the contractor will get the permits for you. Ask for a sales brochure with an illustration of the fence you plan to erect.

3. If you are not sure the fence will conform to the town's code, you can discuss it with Code Enforcement. You must ask for council approval for a nonconforming fence. You can do this either before or after you apply for permits, but it is best to seek council approval in advance.

- 3.1. The council likes to know that your immediate neighbors don't object to the proposed variation, so it is good to ask them to sign a statement to that effect.
- 3.2. It is helpful to have a picture or drawing of the fence (a sales brochure will do). It's easier to get approval for an attractive fence.
- 3.3. The council might want to look at the property, so call your council member to make a request at least a week ahead of the legislative meeting. You can also contact Code Enforcement.
- 3.4. It is not required, but it helps if you attend the council meeting so you can answer questions.

4. If the fence is over 48 inches tall, you'll need a county permit. The process takes about an hour and typically costs \$35, although the fees vary by the job. You will need a rough drawing of your lot that shows its dimensions and the fence location (a survey plat is **not** required). You will need a list of the materials used (wood, vinyl, wrought iron). You can apply for the county permit at the county's Permits Office, 9400 Peppercorn Place, Largo; call 301-883-5784 for more information.

5. After you get a county permit, bring the same paperwork to the town office; the typical fee is \$25. Town staff will review the application, and if the fence conforms to code, they usually will issue the permit within a business day. You or your fence company can apply at the town office at 5008 Queensbury Road; call 301-927-6381 for more information.

6. If the fence is nonconforming and has not already been approved by the council, the town staff will give the paperwork to the council, and the application will be reviewed at the next legislative session (the first Monday of each month, 8 p.m., at Town Hall). If the council approves your request, the permit will be issued and you may start the project.

Steve Durovic

Stevan W. Durovic, a former Riverdale Park resident and Ward 1 council representative, died at his home in College Park on May 26, 2006. He was 59. Born in Buenos Aires, Argentina, Steve came to this country when he was three. In the late 1980s and early 1990s, Steve served four consecutive council terms. Perhaps his most notable accomplishment—and there were many—was the complete revision of the town's charter and code. He worked tirelessly for the betterment of Riverdale Park.

Steve had a J.D. from Georgetown University Law Center, and he worked as a trial attorney for the U.S. Department of Labor from 1975 until 2005. He wrote most of the regulations for the ERISA retirement law and tried numerous cases for the Department's Planned Benefits and Security Division. He was also a wellknown audiophile and sports nut. When the Wizards were the Bullets and they played at the Capital Centre, Steve had season tickets behind the bench.

I was lucky enough to get to know Steve when I worked on the *Town Crier* in the early 1990s. He was as well-known for his incisive reasoning as he was for his wry sense of humor. At his wake, as I stood quietly by his casket, I noticed something unusual—a tag and chain about his neck. Steve's sister noticed me staring at it. She sighed softly and with a faint smile explained, "Oh that Steve—he requested that he be buried with his government ID tag." I had to smile too. It was pure Durovic. So I nodded to him, turned, and left the funeral home to attend a council meeting. Steve would have approved. Rest in peace Steve, you will be missed.

Area Residents Volunteer For Clean Up Effort

On Saturday morning, June 3, 2006 more than 15 volunteers from Riverdale Park's Madison Hill community joined residents throughout Prince George's County in the Area-wide Community Clean-up Day. Free Mulch. There is free untreated mulch available to residents of Riverdale Park. The mulch pile is located at the end of Queensbury Rd next to Public Works. Help yourself to as much as you can <u>use</u>.

Spring Clean-up was a great success. On Spring Clean-up Day, Public Works removed 16 truck loads of trash totaling 60.98 tons for a savings to the Town of \$3,294.20. This did not include the 2.74 tons of metal put out on this day also. Public Works also removed 2.86 tons of yard waste, 0.68 tons of paper, and another 10.57 tons of trash that week. In this four-day work week Public Works picked up and removed 77.83 tons.

Keep our Town Beautiful. Please sweep or remove grass clippings and weeds from the sidewalk and curb/gutter when mowing lawns or trimming weeds near the sidewalk or streets. It is against the Town Code to cause any material of any kind to be scattered, dropped, etc. upon any street, alley, sidewalk, gutter, roadway or public place within the town. This allows easy flow of water along the gutters and keeps our town beautiful.

How do you thank someone who has done so much for so many people? On June 23, 2006, neighbors, current and past Town Officials, Town Employees, and friends gathered to pay tribute and thank Doris Pullman for her many long years of volunteer services to Riverdale Park. Doris recently built a home on the Eastern Shore and is moving to enjoy her retirement.

Doris is one of those unique individuals that come along once in a lifetime. She loves to volunteer! And, throughout her lifetime she has spent countless hours doing just that--volunteering thousands of hours to numerous events and people that have had the honor of crossing paths with her. Doris lived in Riverdale Park for 47 years raising her children here. Her husband Robert Pullman died not too long ago, and with her children grown, married, and on their own, Doris decided it was time to find a new place to ply her special gifts. So, she began looking toward the Eastern Shore and a quieter setting. She recently told me that her new community is like Riverdale Park was 30 years ago--a small town, quiet, and friendly where everyone knows everyone.

So, we threw a surprise Tea and Dessert with Doris—An Evening To Celebrate Doris Pullman's Many Contributions to Riverdale Park. There are numerous other volunteer activities with her church and within the community. Her contributions are too many to elaborate here.
